MANAGING CASES FROM A TO Z: Students in **Georgia State Law clinical programs** have assisted **thousands of individuals** and **families** manage controversies and resolve legal disputes. The new **Investor Advocacy Clinic**, which launched this fall, will help people who have suffered losses because of broker misconduct and educate individuals about investments and how to avoid financial fraud.

Through clinical opportunities, students become familiar with different **communication types, decision-making styles** and ultimately gain confidence in the practice of law. The clinics and programs handle about 500 cases each year.

Georgia State Law students represent underserved Georgians through these programs and courses:

- **Capital Defenders Clinic**
- **Bankruptcy Assistance and Practice Program**
- **Fulton County Landlord-Tenant Mediation Program**
- **Fundamentals of Law Practice** (domestic violence)
- **Health Legislation and Advocacy**

Clinical students influence cases from start to finish:

- The **HeLP Clinic** assists families whose children are in treatment with Children’s Healthcare of

- The **Investor Advocacy Clinic** represents small investors who suffer losses from broker misconduct, and is funded in part by FINRA Investor Education Foundation. law.gsu.edu/iac
