Short-Term Hiring Assistance and Recruitment Program (S.H.A.R.P.)

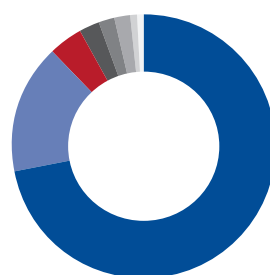
Through S.H.A.R.P. employers can access a pool of pre-qualified candidates for short-term projects (usually within 24 hours).

- reciprocity services that allow students and alumni to use other law schools' career services facilities when relocating to another state after graduation.

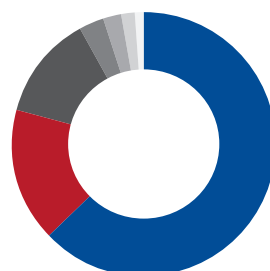

To apply, prospective students must submit:

- Application through LSAC with \$50 fee
- Personal statement
- Credential Assembly Service (CAS) Law School Report containing your LSAT scores, undergraduate/graduate transcripts and your recommendation letters

- **Oct. 1:** Application period opens
- **March 15:** Priority deadline for merit scholarship consideration

Policies

- First-year J.D. students are accepted for the fall semester only.
- Georgia State Law has a rolling admission policy.
- A bachelor's degree from a regionally accredited college or university is required to register.
- Georgia State Law cannot admit students who are ineligible for readmission to another law school.
- Prospective students must submit all required documents through the Credential Assembly Service of the Law School Admission Council (LSAC).
- Never send documents directly to the admissions office unless requested.
- We do not grant personal interviews.
- For more information, sign up for an information session or class visit.
- The faculty admissions committee reviews files from January until the class is full.
- Full-time students cannot work more than 20 hours per week at any combination of jobs.



BAR CHARACTER AND FITNESS REQUIREMENTS

Every American jurisdiction in which students may practice law after graduation from law school requires each applicant for admission to the bar to meet character and fitness requirements as a condition of eligibility for admission. Students are encouraged, as they go through the law school application process and before they enter law school, to determine the requirements of the jurisdiction(s) where they intend to practice law. If a student is uncertain where he or she will practice law, he or she may wish to review the Standard NCBE Character and Fitness Application, titled Request for Preparation of a Character Report, of the National Conference of Bar Examiners, which is used by a number of jurisdictions' bar admission authorities. Addresses for all relevant agencies are available at ncbex.org.

Knowles Conference Center

College of Law Faculty, Staff and Students

Any Georgia State College of Law faculty or staff member, or any registered student attending classes at the College of Law. This includes any groups affiliated or a part of the College of Law.

Internal Groups

University Departments

Any officially recognized campus department that has a clearly defined connection to Georgia State University and receives university funding.

Chartered Student Organizations

Any student organization that is identified as 'Chartered' through the student organization chartering process. More information can be found at the Office of Georgia State University Student Organizations.

Co-Sponsored Groups

Any non-university entity collaborating with a university department or chartered student organization. The event must be consistent with the missions and goals of the sponsoring university department or organization. A representative of the sponsoring department or organization must serve as the main point of contact and assume responsibility for planning and reconciliation of charges incurred from the event.

Group Sponsorship

The sponsoring Georgia State University department or organization contacts the Knowles Conference Center staff to check date availability. If the space is available, the sponsor will submit a request for space for approval by the Knowles Conference Center director. If approved, the sponsoring department assumes responsibility before, during, and after the event for:

- All event-related costs, including room fees, set-up fees, parking, audio-visual fees, catering, etc.
- Communicating all event needs to the Center
- Having sponsoring departmental staff on-site for the event

External, Non-University or Unaffiliated Groups

An external, non-university or unaffiliated group is defined as any group, organization, corporation or individual with no connection to Georgia State University or an individual or group requesting space for personal use. The individual or group must enter into a contractual agreement with Georgia State for use of space and services by completing a Facilities Use Agreement, set to terms specific to the event. In addition, non-university, unaffiliated, external or co-sponsored events will require valid proof of insurance as outlined in the Facilities Use Agreement.

Audio/Visual Support



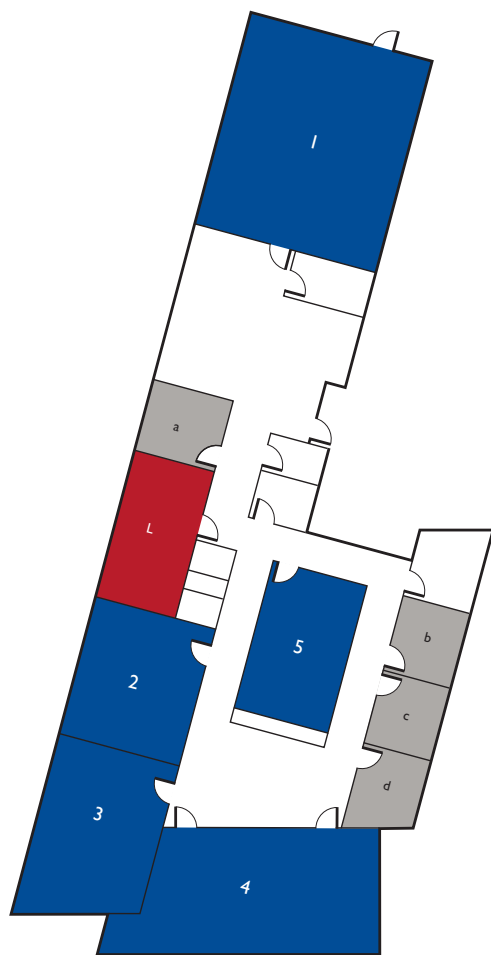

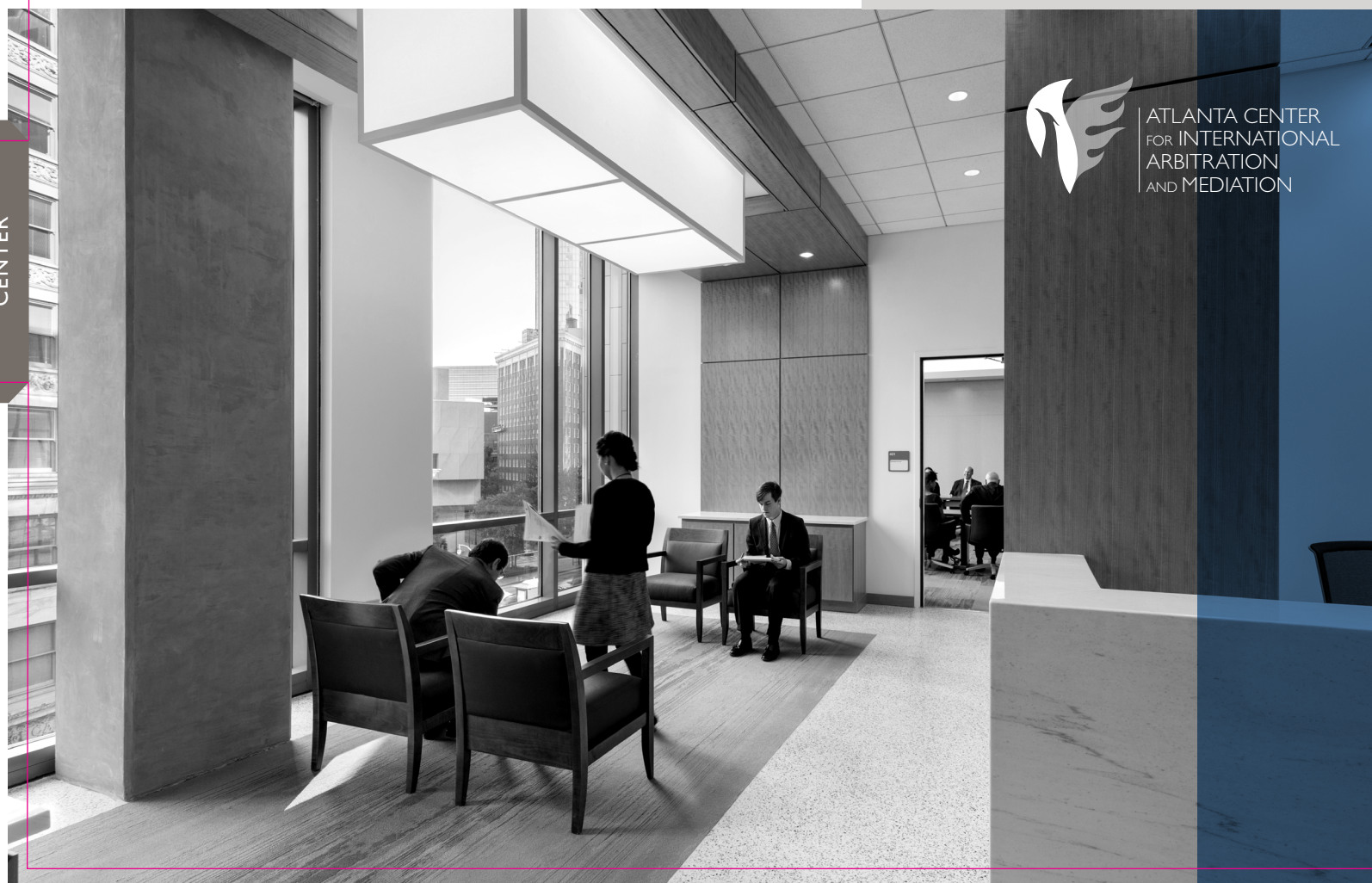

The Externship Program places Georgia State Law students with more than 70 government agencies, nonprofit organizations and judges in Atlanta. Becoming an Extern Supervisor

To mentor Georgia State Law externs in your office, you must apply for approval.

Participation Requirements

The program can only consider new sites that meet these minimum criteria:


1. The placement is with a judge, nonprofit organization or governmental agency. We do not place students in private corporations or law firms.
2. At least one attorney, employed at the site, must supervise the extern(s).
3. Because the externship is intended to be a learning experience rather than an employment experience, supervisors must be willing to act as mentors. Often, it requires more time to supervise a student than to complete the work oneself. Supervisors must be willing to provide regular feedback to each extern about work performance and written work product.
4. The work performed by the extern must be legal in nature.

Although agencies that meet the above criteria will be considered, priority will be given to those placements that offer students exposure to fields of law under-represented in the Externship Program.

Bankruptcy Assistance & Practice

The Bankruptcy Assistance and Practice Program allows second- and third-year students to work with Atlanta Legal Aid Society and low-income Georgians facing debt crisis, foreclosure and bankruptcy.

The Pro Se Assistance Project (P.A.P.) Volunteer bankruptcy attorneys and students provide free legal guidance through 20-minute consultations to individuals representing themselves in proceedings.

Capital Defender Clinic

Second- and third-year students to assist Office of Georgia Capital Defenders attorneys in all aspects of preparing indigent clients' death penalty cases for trial in each phase of the case.

Fundamentals of Law Practice

Students learn practice skills and ethical decision-making through simulating the work of a small, general practice law firm. Course

work includes simulation exercises and actual client representation in domestic violence cases in Cobb County.

Health Legislation and Advocacy

This two-semester clinic examines the process by which legislation is enacted into state law—including drafting, legislative organization and procedure, ethics and lobbying, and the appropriations process. Students work with a community partner organization or agency on upcoming proposed health-related legislation in the Georgia General Assembly.

HeLP Legal Services Clinic

The HeLP Legal Services Clinic represents the low-income families of children receiving health care services through Children's Healthcare of Atlanta. Students work with clinical faculty and a variety of partners—including medical schools, social workers and public health educators—to hone skills in client interviewing and counseling, case management and other advanced aspects of health-related cases.

Investor Advocacy Clinic

The Investor Advocacy Clinic trains students in arbitration, negotiation and mediation as they work with investors who have suffered losses resulting from broker misconduct and cannot secure private legal representation because of the size of their claim. Students also provide smart investment education to the public.

Landlord – Tenant Mediation Clinic

Students mediate landlord/tenant disputes and other disputes, including cases handled in the State and Magistrate courts; particularly small claim civil issues such as disputes between neighbors, consumers and businesses and creditors and debtors.

Law Volunteer Clinic for Veterans

The Law Volunteer Clinic for Veterans provides free legal assistance to student veterans at Georgia State. Volunteer attorneys assist veterans with most legal issues including veterans' benefits, divorce, wills, landlord/tenant and discharge issues.

Olmstead Disability Rights Clinic

The Olmstead Disability Rights Clinic is a partnership with Atlanta Legal Aid Society's Disability Integration Project. Inspired by advocacy based on the Supreme Court case *Olmstead v. L.C.*, students help clients obtain the assistance they need to live at home instead of in an institution.

Philip C. Cook Low-Income Taxpayer Clinic

Students provide legal representation to low-income individuals during the post-audit stage of their disputes with the Internal Revenue Service. The tax clinic provides professional skills and substantive training on filing status, credits and exemptions, immigration status and collection issues.

Pro Bono Program

Center for Access to Justice's Pro Bono Program connects students with legal volunteer opportunities to address unmet legal needs under the supervision of a practicing attorney to enhance the capacity of the law to do justice.

Urban Fellows

Urban Fellows, an interdisciplinary initiative of the Center for the Comparative Study of Metropolitan Growth, connects graduate students from Georgia State and Georgia Institute of Technology's School of City and Regional Planning to scholars and leading professionals to study and discuss issues related to urban growth.

Georgia State Law Experiential Courses

Our practice-based courses and programs teach students in a traditional classroom setting with a professor, textbooks and case studies while also immersing themselves in real-world client work under the supervision of local volunteer attorneys, many of whom are alumni.

In our realistic simulation courses, students are challenged by new, specially designed course materials that simulate legal cases and problems. Because our students get the chance to practice being lawyers in the classroom, they gain the skills and confidence to be successful in the courtroom or wherever else their careers take them.
